As you will know, next week on the 6^{th} of May we have our local body elections and it will be our civic duty to use our voting franchise to elect our local leaders for an effective governance.

I was at an Interfaith theological advisory meeting discussing about Christian-Muslim issues related to racism and also at Centre for Theology and Justice meeting discussing about the theological nuances about legacies during this week.

This Sunday, the 2nd of May 2021 is observed by the Methodist Church as the Vocations Sunday, inviting people to reflect on the calling of God in our lives. Lord's Prayer

Intro talk:

In the Bible reading we will hear soon, Jesus talks about a Vine. This is a plant, which grows grapes. For a vine, or any plant to grow strong, and grow fruit, it needs to be well fed. Also, it sometimes needs its branches cutting shorter, this is called pruning because this helps the new branch that grows to have more fruit.

Jesus says in the reading that he is like a Vine and we are like the branches. In our Bibles the word used is to 'abide' with Jesus, this means to be connected, or plugged in.

If you think of a mobile phone with low battery, it needs to be plugged in to recharge. We need to be connected well with Jesus if we are to have the full power of God. Sometimes our phones' memory is full and we have to delete some Apps so that the phone can still work. If you've ever had to do this it is really hard to choose which Apps to delete and which are the really important ones to keep. This is a bit like pruning a plant. Similarly, as disciples of Jesus, sometimes we have to stop some of the things we do, so the really important things can happen.

Can you think of things you do that help you to stay plugged in to Jesus? What sort of things help you to be kind, and generous and loving?

Maybe make a list or draw the things that help you be like Jesus and be plugged in to Jesus. What things at school or work, at home and church help you to be loving and generous and kind?

Thinking about these things might make you feel thankful – that's good. Tell Jesus about that - it's a thank you prayer.

Can you think of things that fill your life but make it hard to do the right things?

What things at school or work, at home and church make it hard for you to be loving and generous and kind?

Maybe make a list, or draw those things too – it might make you sad, but that's ok. You can talk to Jesus about it - that's a sorry prayer.

John 15:1-9

Reflection

It is interesting that Jesus choses imagery of the vine. In the Old Testament the vine is sometimes used as a symbol of the Messiah, a sign of hope, and sometimes it is used as a metaphor for Israel when the people have been found lacking in terms of their Godliness; when there is a need for change.

What we read in John chapter 15 is both hopeful whilst making clear that we need to change.

It is hopeful because we are reminded that we are interconnected with the Spirit of God through our relationship with Jesus. The words that spring to my mind are love, fruitfulness, joy, abundance, connection and abiding with. What words come to your mind when you think of being connected through the Holy Spirit, with Jesus?

What do you think it means to abide with Jesus? If I play a word association game I go from abide, to live with, then I think of home, then of rest, then of safety, to family, to friends and to love. To abide in Jesus is all of that and more; we are invited to abide in all that Jesus is. If

we are to abide in all that Jesus is, then we will be fully alive, we are nourished with the same life giving Spirit, we are loved, just as Jesus is loved by the Creator.

What do you think are the abundant fruits of a life lived like this? If we were to list them, they might be characteristics like love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Today is Vocations Sunday and I think a vocation that is nourished in the life giving Spirit of God would have fruit like this list – let's hear them again; love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

However, words like calling and vocation can scare us sometimes, so I think of it like this: the primary call of a Christian is to follow Jesus, and the journey that emerges from that, for each of us, is our own unique vocation. Do you see your journey with Jesus as a vocation? Or do you think that are vocations are just for Ministers, and nurses and teachers?

There is a story about a student who loses in his room, the watch he inherited from his grandad; he cannot find it anywhere as the room is a mess. So he goes to his neighbour's room to look for it there, as it is easier to find things in a tidy room. His teacher passes by and asks him 'why are you looking for something where it is not?'

Do we sometimes look for a sense of vocation where it is not? The Bible reading today suggests that the abundant fruit will grow where we are most connected to The Vine. So on Vocations Sunday, I wonder, what happens if we look at where our life is bearing fruit and ask, 'could this be evidence of my vocation?'

Pause a minute and ask yourself: Where in life, at the moment, are signs of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control?

As mentioned earlier, this Bible reading also speaks some tough words about us needing to change, to be pruned.

It might be that things that were once bearing abundant fruit, that were once our vocation, are not anymore.

How do we know if some of our vocational branches are ready to be pruned?

Are there things you are doing, possibly in the name of God and church, that are actually now a burden, a chore, that bring a sense of gloom, and sadly either don't bear any fruit or the fruit is no longer abundant and juicy? If so, it might be time for change, time to have those branches pruned.

Vocations Sunday isn't just about you and me as individuals and our own vocations; it is also about the vocation of the church.

Where is the abundant fruit in the life of your church? And what needs to be pruned? As we emerge from lockdown, this is the time to ask, what is the vocation of the church in the time and the place we find ourselves? Is it the same as it was in 2019? Or has that which was fruitful now dried up? We possibly have some hard decisions to make as church communities.

My brother-in law lives on a vineyard in France, and when the tractors come to prune the vines it looks brutal, but it is necessary if the vine is to grow new and delicious fruit.

Our God is a God of love and a God of invitation. God waits patiently in our lives. As we work out our vocations, individually and as a community, God is waiting, but God isn't waiting like the vacuum packed grapes in the supermarket, waiting for us to open the packet and let the fruit out. God is waiting and is active. The invitation is to look, and to notice where God is at work, where there is evidence of the fruit of God's Spirit. That's where we join in.

Today's Gospel Reading: John 15 v 1-8

Time to Reflect

Let me start by saying that I am no gardener. I enjoy doings things in the garden, but I am mostly clueless. This is particularly evident when it comes to pruning and cutting back. I tend to pussy foot around and snip round the edges of my plants. Take my hedge. It is always untidy with a sort of Dennis the Menace messy haircut look to it, in stark contrast to my next-door neighbour whose own hedge is a thing of beauty, shaped and manicured tightly.

I remember the first winter in my last house, when I was horrified by what the council workers did to the beautiful oak trees lining the Crescent where I lived. It looked devastated, like a nuclear bomb had gone off nearby. I nearly wrote in to complain. I needn't have worried, of course – they did know what they were doing and by the end of that summer the trees were back, only better, with more strength and shape from the new growth.

Pruning and cutting back is essential to the process of growth. Particularly to fruit bearing plants like the vine. Jesus knew it, hence the wonderful image of John 15 v1-8, which has much to say to us this Vocations Sunday.

In the Old Testament the vine is a symbol of Israel, but it is usually mentioned in the context of having been allowed to run wild, for example in Isaiah 5. Vines in the Middle East were (and still are) fast growing and if left unchecked would grow in all directions, with lots of branches, meaning that the fruit bearing branches produced lots of small, poor quality fruit. Quite simply, to produce a good crop, there needed to be regular ruthless pruning, particularly in its early years. Jesus says that he is the true vine, the true Israel if you like and he exhorts his disciples to abide in him, to allow God who is the gardener to prune back those useless and tangled branches, so that good fruit will be produced.

Many of us in the Church (and I include myself too) could learn from this. We take on too many jobs, have too many roles and hats to wear and consider ourselves indispensable. Who else would do it, if not me? The place would fall apart without me, we say. Well maybe we should just try it. Step back. If you do have 3 roles, give up 2 and give your all to the one remaining role. I am not necessarily the best person to invoke garden wisdom, but even I have noticed that you create a space in the garden something else will soon grow there. Perhaps by hanging on to those 2 extra roles we not only reduce the quality of the fruit we produce, but we are preventing others exercising their calling and ministry.

On this Vocations Sunday, when we are asked to reflect on the part we play in the ministry of God's Church, we should consider what needs pruning in our lives, so that the Vine produces abundant, sweet fruit. Sometimes less is more. And if you find this message hard, no sour grapes, please!

Take a time to sit quietly

Prayers of concern

Loving, Lord God, help each of us to abide in you and produce fruit, not any old fruit, but the best fruit we can. Prune us back, remove those areas of our lives that get in the way of each other and help us to concentrate on the things you have truly called us to do. Help us to realise the gifts you have given us and how best to use them for your Kingdom.

Loving, Lord God may your Church be a window to you, that the world may see your love for all people in action. Bring an end to bickering, nit-picking and in-fighting. Unite your Church, give it a voice to challenge injustice and act with kindness. Make it a safe space, where people can reach their potential and work together. Help it to grow in love and produce rich fruit in abundance.

Loving, Lord God, we bring our world and local communities to you. So much conflict, hurt and suffering. We think of those mourning loved ones, those who feel isolated and cut off from family and friends due to the pandemic, those who live in fear for whatever reason. Bring the fruit of healing and peace to their place of need and instill in us a desire to be the answer to that prayer today. Amen.

John 15 v 1-8

Jesus the True Vine

'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who

abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.
