Dear Heaton Moor United Church,

Grace and peace to you all. Hope you are all doing well and have had a good week.

Thanks to Graham Adams who will be leading our Super Sunday service this week at Church. I am sure you will enjoy his new hymn which he has written on the lectionary text for this Sunday.

This week has been one of those weeks with full on and quite a tight one with many things happening all around. On Tuesday, I was leading a 'shoppers service' on the market day at St. Mary's in the centre of Stockport and we had some good conversations on the theme 'love for God is shown in our love for the creation.' It was also good to meet and catch up with Anne Wild, who has transferred her membership from East Didsbury to our church. She brings with her lots of gifts, which includes her local preacher gifts and community engagements.

We also had our leadership team meeting this week discussing about the Church meeting on the 21st Nov and also about the Pension appeal from the Connexion.

As a circuit we had a planning meeting about 'Community Sponsorship Scheme' which is about hosting a refugee family through the Home office for two years in Stockport. It gave us lots of ideas of how to go about with this scheme.

We had Gulam Rasool from Heaton Chapel Mosque on A6 and Liz Atherton from the Stockport Council this week at our church for a meeting. It was an opportunity to get to know the different community engagements we have been doing as faith communities and began to explore ways of working together.



Little Amal, a 3.5-meter puppet of a young refugee girl, who began her epic journey from Turkey in July has come to Manchester on the 3rd of November, the final destination. Lots of people gathered to welcome Little Amal at Castlefield only to demonstrate that Manchester is a welcoming place to all people, and refugees are welcome to this place. JoAnne, Elliot and myself were part of many people gathered, and it was an amazing experience to witness the wave of openness and generosity among people in Manchester. Being part of this walk with Amal, was in solidarity with refugees are welcome here.



I also had the opportunity of meeting with Geoff and Gary from FRESH, who have been working tirelessly in Stockport in distributing food to about 1600 children every week in six different local schools. We have been again exploring ways about 'Food and Faith' conversations in the borough of Stockport and also ways of supporting them in their work.

As a staff team we also met to discuss about a course on 'discipleship/membership' and we will give you more update on it in the new year. Sharon has been busy working on getting the documents ready for our Church meeting.

We have our circuit service this Sunday at 4pm at Woodley Methodist Church, and will be led by Eco task group, and kindly join if you are able to. The service is also streamed online and the details are on the circuit website.





Today's Gospel Reading: Mark 12.38-44

Time to Reflect

Jesus accused the religious leaders of his time of exploiting their position in society for personal gain. He warned the people not to be taken in by their outward show and their patronising demeanour; their attitude of

entitlement and demands for the most important seats in the synagogue and the places of honour at banquets. This was all a front, said Jesus; the long pious prayers a sham that hid avarice and pride. The poor, including vulnerable widows who gave generously to the leaders out of respect, were in reality being cheated.

The hypocrisy of the religious leaders is contrasted with the genuine sacrifice of the widow who, despite her dire poverty, gave everything she had in the service of God.

Through this teaching, Jesus asks us to examine our own Christian lives and patterns of giving. Do we go to church to worship God or because we are regarded as "pillars of the congregation" and wish to preserve that status? Are we holding back some of our resources from God for our own benefit instead of wholeheartedly giving our lives, talents and all that we have to his service?

Take a time to sit quietly

A time of prayer

We pray for the church, for the world and for ourselves.

Lord, we pray for a strengthening of integrity, wisdom and faith for all Christian leaders; for resilience and courage for Christians who are persecuted, and for the fresh inspiration of the Holy Spirit to be poured out on all believers so that through their witness all the world will come to know the saving love of Jesus Christ.

Hear our prayers for national leaders, politicians and community leaders and all those who have any power or influence over the lives of others. May they act with compassion, justice and honesty, always putting the needs of the most vulnerable first.

Where there is conflict or war, we pray for the Holy Spirit to turn hard hearts towards peace and dialogue instead of violence. Hear our prayers for hope and restoration for the people of Afghanistan, Yemen, Lebanon and other areas around the world where there is economic

breakdown, food poverty and lack of education provision.

We pray for comfort and courage for all who suffer injury, loss and hardship, for those who are displaced from their homes, and for those who are so desperate they risk their lives on dangerous journeys to reach safety. May God protect and guide them. We give thanks for aid workers who struggle in difficult situations to bring food, shelter and medicines to those in most need.

We ask for the healing touch of Jesus on the lives of people who are ill, in pain, anxious or trapped in addiction. We name in our hearts those known to us and to Jesus who are in need of our prayers and God's love at this time. May they know the peace of mind and heart that only Jesus can give.

Loving God, thank you that you know us through and through, our hopes and dreams, our joys and sorrows. May we continue to know your loving acceptance and blessing in our lives, in Jesus' name. Amen.

Jesus Denounces the Scribes
