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Dear Heaton Moor United Church Family,

Then the Lord opened the mouth of the donkey, and it said to Balaam, "What have I done to you, that you have struck me these three times?" Numbers 22: 28

We have seen films, where animals talking to each other in human language, like in 'Finding Dory' or 'Fantastic Mr. Fox,' etc. and for kids of this generation, who have grown watching these films, animals speaking in human tongue is not a surprise. In the early Hebrew times in Bible, God surprises God's people with things they have not imagined, this time God opened the mouth of faithful friend of prophet Balaam, a donkey, who speaks back to Balaam for when he turned away from what is pleasing to God. It also interesting to note that in this passage, the angel of God is seen by a donkey and not by the prophet, for a donkey and the animal world is privileged to sight the presence of God, whereas it is concealed to humanity. When Balaam strikes his faithful friend, who had carried him all along at this instance thrice, donkey expresses his anger and exposes Balaam's impatience and cruelty towards him. Towards the end, when Balaam's sighted the angel of God after his donkey has sighted, Balaam repents that he had sinned.

This text from Numbers 22:21-35, is an invitation for us as readers to be prepared to be surprised by God, for God speaks to us not just through humans, but through his creation, more specifically through our pets, and the animal world, to expose our disobedience to God.

The presence of God is sighted firstly by the rest of the creation and only at last by the humanity if at all they can recognise, for God's presence is spread across the creation equally, not just the righteous and unrighteous, but also human and non-human (I confess that I am too anthropocentric in this usage.) This text calls us to treat our pets, animals, other creatures and humanity with respect and never mistreat them at any occasion, for we are all made by God as kith and kin in God's creation. Be prepared for a surprise today, that God is speaking to you through the unspeakable, and through the unimagined.

Prayer focus: God of all creation, pets, animals, plants, all creatures and humanity, help us to be prepared to get surprised by you, for you are speaking to us through the unspeakable, and help us to recognise your voice among who we think are incapable of carrying God's voice. Amen.

Let me wish you all a happy summer. May God go with

On December 17th 1965, Beryl gave birth to Debra, a wonderful gift to the whole family. She was born in Stepping Hill Hospital early in the morning, before I had gone to work, it was a day that is still crystal clear in my

memory. Debra was christened at Reddish Green by the Rev. Leslie Dawson.

Three years later, on the 6th January 1969 along came Helen, our second daughter, another wonderful gift that extended our family, and was equally loved the same as Debra. She was also christened at Reddish Green by the Rev. Brian Walker.

Memories of the pantomimes at Reddish Green are still with us (O yes they are!!) when the girls took part and Beryl was the wardrobe mistress and I helped backstage before becoming the baddy in the show. All wonderful memories of Reddish Green.

Sadly, the Reddish Church closed and joined up with the U.R.C. Church in Reddish, which brought us to decision time, when the walk down Reddish Road would have been difficult with two children. So, the decision was to join Heaton Moor Methodist, a Church in which we have been immensely happy. Mid eighties, because of dry rot in the old Church the whole congregation realised that a new building was needed, therefore the whole membership pulled together and the old Church was demolished and the new Church

opened on the 8th December 1990. A superb joint effort led by the Rev. Neil Dixon whose inspiration brought about the building we worship in today. I truly believe that this new Church would not have been brought about if the Holy Spirit had not lead us and inspired the teams that brought all the individuals together to create the current Church.

In 1992, I began studying to be a Local Preacher, and came on plan in 1995 and have not regretted it for one moment, for to preach the Word of God to the people of God is a privilege that I value to this day.

U.R.C. joined with us to create Heaton Moor United Church, a developing unit of Christian folk who take out God's message and who work together to bring the Word of God to the people of Heaton Moor. I pray that the Church will now grow in strength to become a beacon of love for all people for generations yet unborn. May God bless our work and it grow in strength to be God's witness of the Resurrected Christ.

August will see the end of the churches chosen charities this year. The charities this year have been:Lebone and Parkinsons.

We always support a charity at home and one abroad.

Throughout the year many of the events you attend support these charities.

If you want a charity to be supported by the church let the office know and it will be passed on the fundraising commitee.



Total raised £6768.23 this is including donations that people do through standing orders. This is for 2 years as no monies were sent last year.

This charity was chosen as it has established links with the church, over the years they have visited us, and we have visited them.

Many of you have enjoyed a strawberry tea whist supporting this cause at the event that is held every year.

For those new to hearing about Lebone here is a brief history of the charity that is based in South Africa.

The seed for the vision of a care centre for children abandoned or orphaned because of HIV/AIDS, was planted in December of 1997, Lebone House!! (Lebone' means 'Light' in Sesotho). The care centre was opened in 2000. The Lebone vision expanded and grew. On Lebone land there is now a Lebone Edu Centre where the children of Lebone House are educated. There is an Agricultural Produce Centre, which feeds 600 people and creates some income. A Skills Development Centre now empowers people with a skill and gives them the opportunity to generate an income. The Training and Counselling Centre does basic HIV/AIDS education and homebased care. Also, pastoral, bereavement and social support.

The homebased charity was Parkinson's. Several members of the congregation have or are living with this condition, so to support them we are supporting this charity.



Total raised £1902.32 this is half of the monies raised through the events held in the church this year.

People with Parkinson's deserve better


In 1969 Mali Jenkins founded the Parkinson's Disease Society.

Mali's sister, Sarah, had been living with the disease for some years. Mali placed adverts in the personal columns of a couple of newspapers asking people to come forward who were interested in forming an exploratory steering group.

The first meeting consisted of only 16 people. It was at Westminster hospital on 26th February 1969 but led to the foundation of the 'Parkinson's Disease Society', now 'Parkinson's UK'.

One million people across the UK are affected by Parkinson's 87% of people with Parkinson's have faced harassment and discrimination.

Rev Marjorie Grantham 1941-2019



It is my great pleasure to write about our dear friend, Marjorie.

Marjorie wrote her own eulogy for her funeral but not as far as we are aware, her own obituary.

As many of you know, Marjorie was an orphan who was adopted by a couple who had the village shop in Middlewood. Marjorie had an idyllic childhood, delivering newspapers, working in the shop, her main task being to clean the bacon slicer! She went to school in Macclesfield train, traveling by train (at the time both rail stations were open at Middlewood).

Eventually the family moved to Reddish where there were other members of the family. Marjorie, in the meantime, had been off to Teacher training college to become a primary school teacher. Years later she became ill and had to take early retirement, still living in Reddish and attending Christ Church where she was a member of the Regnal League for many years and took office. I remember her going off to conference and becoming a local preacher.

Our first 'getting to know her' was when she became office secretary at the new Church, Heaton Moor, with Rev Neil Dixon and during this time, received her calling to be an ordained Minister in the Methodist Church. Marjorie did her training and elected to become a Minister in local employment, unpaid, in the Stockport Methodist circuit where she concentrated on pastoral care, especially in care and nursing homes. She also frequently preached and took up many other Ministerial duties, becoming much loved in the circuit, so much so that when she was ordained at Ormskirk URC Church, we took a full coach load to support her, getting lost, and having to delay the start of the service!!

Around this time Marjorie moved into a new flat at the 'Laurels', Mauldeth Road, becoming our neighbour and my chauffeur, taking me to services and meetings and regularly to Heatons Churches prayer breakfasts. She became part of our family coming to birthdays, games evenings and seeing new years eve's together. Marjorie gained a friend in Phyllis Haigh, going out for lunches and helping her prepare the stalls for Christmas and summer fairs. I can picture her blowing balloons up and at the gate, collecting entrance money. She also had very good friends in Banbury where she had holiday breaks. Unfortunately, Marjorie's health began to fail with ongoing problems leading to major circulation issues, stent inputs and finally her leg amputation. She bore all this with amazing resilience, patience and never-ending good humor



Losing her car was a blow but she took on her electric wheelchair, learned new routes to Church, the health centre and the 'Blue Corn Café', meeting up with regular friends where the owner was such a support to her and chief mechanic for her wheelchair!

Marjorie's physical strength weakened and after numerous times in hospital and recuperation, the decision was made that she could no longer manage on her own so she moved into Fern Lea rest home in Hazel Grove where again she was in and out of hospital and was diagnosed with cancer. After much pain, so bravely borne, she was released, to be with her Lord and saviour, Jesus Christ, in peace and love, where she so wanted to be. Nothing can describe the way she had fought so much, suffering undeservedly for so long, as was said by so many, 'The bravest person they had ever known'.

So many friends and Church members visited her regularly and I know she was so grateful for those visits and 'scrabble mornings', especially when communion was brought by Ministers and the superintendent.

I feel I must mention certain people who went beyond anything she expected. Niece, Jayne, loved and cared for her for so many years, especially in all the practicalities of life and she was so loved by Marjorie along with husband, Garry and their son, Dylan.

Jean James, along with George, were magnificent at sorting Marjorie's problems, always at the end of the phone as well as constant visits and feeding her, she was so grateful. David Smith, along with Audrey in wheelchair, visited her wherever she was, hospitals, care homes, and David took Marjorie, in his vehicle, to Church, appointments, Church events and

his own home. He took her to her final appearance, at our 60th wedding anniversary, she loved you both.

We miss you dear Marjorie, never will you be forgotten. However, we rejoice in the privilege we have had in knowing a dear sister in Christ who has enriched so many lives in so many different ways.
